



TREFTADAETH COPR CYMRU WALES'S COPPER HERITAGE

Mae pethau sy'n ein hatgoffa o hanes cyfoethog copr Cymru i'w
gweld ar ein tirwedd, yn ein hamgueddfeydd a'n canolfannau
treftadaeth.

Mae treftadaeth y diwydiant copr byd-eang hanesyddol wedi cael
ei chydnabod i fod o bwysigrwydd byd-eang. Cafodd Tirwedd
Mwyloddi Gorllewin Dyfnaint a Chernyw ei dynodi yn safle
Treftadaeth y Byd gan UNESCO yn 2006. Yn 2009 enwebwyd
Tirwedd Mwyloddi Copr Namaqualand, De Affrica, a grewyd
yn rhannol gan gyfranogiad Cymreig.

Mae adfywio safleoedd copr yn sgil cynlluniau treftadaeth wedi
rhoi bywyd newydd i ardaloedd eraill hefyd, megis Amgueddfa
Mwyloddi Copr Allihies, Sir Cork, Gweriniaeth Iwerddon a
Burra, 'Tref Treftadaeth Mwyloddi Copr', De Awstralia.

Mae 2011 yn flwyddyn gofiadwy o ran cadw treftadaeth copr
Cymru. Ym mis Ionawr, cyhoeddodd Dinas a Sir Abertawe a
Phrifysgol Abertawe barheriaeth i archwilio sut y gellir adfywio'r
14 adeilad a nodwedd sydd ag arwyddocad rhyngwladol yng
ngwaith copr Hafod-Morfa.

Ym mis Mawrth cododd Ymddiriedolaeth Treftadaeth
Ddiwydiannol Amlwch yn agos i £3 miliwn i gadw a hyrwyddo
treftadaeth ddiwydiannol, gymdeithasol ac amgylcheddol
Mynydd Parys a Phorth Amlwch.

Reminders of the rich history of Welsh copper can be found in our
landscape, museums and heritage centres.


The heritage of the historic global copper industry has been
recognised as being of world importance. The West Devon and
Cornwall Mining Landscape was inscribed as a World Heritage
site by UNESCO in 2006. The Namaqualand Copper Mining
Landscape, South Africa, partly created by Welsh involvement,
was nominated in 2009.

Heritage-led regeneration of copper sites has given new life to
other areas as well, such as the Allihies Copper Mine Museum,
County Cork, Republic of Ireland, and Burra, 'Copper Mining
Heritage Town', South Australia.


2011 is a landmark year for conserving the copper heritage of
Wales. In January the City and County of Swansea and Swansea
University announced a partnership to explore how the 14
internationally significant buildings and features of the Hafod-
Morfa copperworks sites can be regenerated.

In March, Amlwch Industrial Heritage Trust raised nearly £3
million to preserve and promote the industrial, social and
environmental heritage of Parys Mountain and Amlwch Port.
